It is time for you and your Lodge to plan next year's budget. Veterans have served for us and deserve our best efforts to plan, budget and fund programs for them. "So long as there are Veterans, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks will never forget them."

First and foremost, APPLY FOR AND OBTAIN ENF AND ENVSC GRANTS! The job of budgeting for Veterans programs becomes easier with the reasonable expectation of grants. <u>Every</u> Lodge can apply for a \$2,000.00 Beacon Grant. <u>Every</u> Lodge can make the GER's ENF per capita donation goal of \$4.60 and become eligible for a \$2,000.00 Gratitude Grant. <u>Every</u> Lodge can think big and apply for up to \$10,000.00 for an Impact Grant. And <u>every</u> Lodge can apply for one of the 140 grants of \$2,000.00 available for Veterans projects through the ENVSC.

If your Lodge has not yet settled on a continuing community project, what better project is there than to help veterans? To learn more, go to Elks.org and click on "Veterans Service". Read about Army of Hope, Adopt-A-Veteran, the Leather Program, Stand-Downs, Comfort Care Kits, Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service (VAVS) in Veterans medical facilities, and much, much more. Find out what other Lodges are doing. Look around town and see what needs done.

Many communities have a local business that would like to contribute to support a Lodge charitable project, but needs a 501(c)(3) recipient to do this properly. This can be done by a restricted contribution through the ENF's Lodge Assistance Grant program (LAG). Again, learn more at "Elks National Foundation" at Elks.org.

Lodges want and need to expand the Elks' "brand" in their communities. A strong Veteran's project could be the impact for which you are looking. Wise use of grants will allow the Lodge to extend service to veterans without putting a strain on the rest of the budget. This could be a wonderful win-win for veteranss and for your Lodge. ADOPT-A-VETERAN PROGRAM

For over thirty years the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks has been actively involved in our Adopt-A-Veteran-Program. The Elks' commitment, "So long as there are Veterans, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks will never forget them", is as relevant today as it was many years ago. We must not ignore the needs of our Veterans, especially those who are without family and friends close by. We can help brighten their lonely days by adopting them and involving them in Lodge activities, providing outings and dinners and making them feel special and honored for their sacrifices.

Lodges can become involved by following these five simple steps:

1. The VAVS Representative (or chairman at a state facility) secures the names of Veterans without family or friends nearby and forwards the list to the State Elks National Veterans Service Commission Chairman.

2. The State Elks National Veterans Service Commission Chairman will divide the list among the Lodges in close proximity to the facility and forward the names to the appropriate District Chairman.

3. The District Chairman will determine how many Veterans each Lodge wishes to adopt. He will then provide the Lodges with a like amount of names.

4. The Lodge should publish the names and birthdays (without year) of its adopted Veterans in its bulletin each month and encourage members and their families to schedule visits with our deserving Veterans. You can talk about their service, sports and current events, etc. Calling them occasionally would also be very much appreciated.

5. Gifts for Veterans should consist of personal care items, reading material, games and similar items of nominal cost. Luncheons and dinners at a restaurant or the Lodge are also recommended.

Let us make sure our Veterans are never forgotten, Adopt-A-Veteran today!

NORTH CAROLINA STATE ELKS ASSOCIATION CHARITABLE TRUST

The following is a small explanation of the NC Charitable Trust and the Gerald and Lea Coates Endowment fund.

The Charitable Trust is a North Carolina State Elks Association corporation founded October 28, 1993, and if you belong to a Elks Lodge in good standing in NC, then you are a member of the NC Charitable Trust. Currently all lodges in NC are members.

The Trust was established to ensure that the Charitable and Benevolent Works of the Elks Lodges in North Carolina will remain financially viable into the future. The Charitable Trust is governed by its By-laws-Article I through Article XII.

North Carolina State Elks Charitable Trust funds make it possible for us to pursue a variety of valuable endeavors for North Carolinian's each year. When you contribute to the NC State Charitable Trust, Inc. you are insuring that we will be able to continue our state major projects in the years to come. Trust funds are dedicated solely to projects deemed important in NC by the NC Elks and the NC Elks State Charitable Trust Inc. These projects include purchasing transportation vans, televisions, power wheel chairs, comfort items, and sponsoring activities for NC State Veterans in Veterans nursing Homes and VA Centers as well as supporting Camp Carefree, a camp for children with chronic illnesses.

The Gerald and Lea Coates Endowment Fund was established October 24, 1997 and is an entity for the charities of the North Carolina State Elks Association Charitable Trust, Inc. A perpetual endowment fund set aside for the sole purpose of preservation of the principle and the generation of income. When your gift is received a card will be sent in your name to the family of the deceased or to the person honored in observance of a special occasion. The amount of the gift will not be indicated. You will receive an acknowledgment of your gift, which may be tax deductible. The NCSEACT is a, by law, Non-Profit Tax Exempted Organization as described in IRA section 501©(3).

Planned gifts include bequests, gifts of life insurance and retirement plans, and other contributions made through a donor's estate. Through a will, living trust, or retirement plan, individual can make gifts that are larger than anything they could imagine in their lifetime. The process is very simple for most individuals. You need only to include appropriate language in your will.

Gifts through wills, living trust, or retirement plans offer a number of advantages such as: They are revocable by the donor if circumstances change. They realize the donor's vision for the future in a tangible way without an uncomfortable financial burden during his or her lifetime. Individuals may choose to designate their support to any part of the Trust. For individuals who wish to support at the North Carolina State Elks Association Charitable Trust Inc. levels that will produce an endowment in perpetuity, separate endowment agreements can be created to spell out the donor's wishes. They may reduce estate tax for the surviving family members.
