
### Past State President J. Byron Long

The North Carolina State Elks Association (NCSEA) has two major projects. Assisting our veterans in the four NC State Veterans Homes, and Camp Carefree, a camp for children with chronic illnesses.

Since its inception, NC Elks have provided TV's in each resident room for 3 of the 4 Veterans Homes, purchased and donated handicap buses and vans for each of the Homes, provided the resident Veterans with clothing and other items to help them have a more comfortable life, and sponsored dinners, picnics, outings and other entertainment.

At Camp Carefree NC Elks have funded camp improvements and funded scholarships to allow children with special needs to attend a one week camping session where they can swim, ride horses, and just be kids. Camp Carefree is non-profit and is staffed by volunteer councilors, nurses, and doctors.

The purpose is for Lodges to interact with and honor local businesses for proper display of the United States Flag during the day, and at night with illumination. This program will increase the Elks' presence in our communities and influence growth and survival. The program is available on the Grand Lodge web site. Lodges can print the certificate, which is a downloadable and fillable PDF document.



## How is the Elks National Foundation Helping North Carolina?



During the 2017-18 Lodge year, the Elks of North Carolina donated \$120,005.91 to the Elks National Foundation.

This year, the Foundation will give back the following:

State Charities Grant: \$80,110.00 Special Projects Grant: \$54,440.00

Bonus Grant: \$16,280.00

These grants support your state's major charitable project, as well as other philanthropic projects. Portions of these grants will also support your state's Drug Awareness Program, Hoop Shoot, Soccer Shoot and educational programs.

Most Valuable Student: \$28,000.00

Legacy Award: \$16,000.00

We will award a total of 7 Most Valuable Student scholarships to high school seniors from your state. In addition, we will award up to 4 Legacy scholarships to children, grandchildren and stepchildren of Elks.

National Veterans Service Commission: \$14,340.00

These funds will help them provide aid and comfort to hospitalized veterans.

**Grand Total: \$209,170.00** 

That's a ratio of **1.743** for every dollar the Foundation received from your state last year. And that doesn't even include the money Lodges in your state will get back through our **Community Investments Program**. For the 2017-18 fiscal year, for example, we awarded a total of **\$184,500.00** to **30** North Carolina Lodges.

### **NCSEA Supplies Disaster Relief After Hurricane Florence**

Following Hurricane Florence's devastating visit to our region, the North Carolina State Elks Association activated its Disaster Relief Fund, and directed District Relief Coordinator and Raleigh Elks Lodge member Michelle DeLaire to lead the relief effort.

On the Tuesday after the storm, Raleigh Elks Lodge Members made over 700 goodie bags, loaded with cookies, granola bars, candy, etc. 100 of these bags were sent to Brunswick County, 400 to New Bern, and the remainder to Carteret and Duplin County.

The next day, Wednesday, they took a road trip to New Bern to deliver a pallet of water, pork, beans, potatoes, and other supplies for the New Bern Elks Lodge to feed the hard hit area. They served over 400 plates of food to residents in need of a hot meal.

Returning to Raleigh, the Elks reloaded their trailers and set out for the Oak Island Elks Lodge with 3 pallets of water and all necessary supplies for a BBQ plate dinner for Brunswick County residents. Seeing the need for further assistance, the next day, they delivered 2 pallets of water to the Cape Fear Regional Jetport distribution center for residents of Southport.

Although it had been a busy week, on Friday Elks served 473 BBQ plate dinners at the Jetport to area disaster workers. They included, police, firemen, utility workers, Food Lion employees, and Operation Jetport Volunteers.

Saturday, saw these Elk volunteers returning To Boiling Springs Lakes where they prepared and served over 300 meals of hot dog, baked beans, and chips. Many of the Duke Energy and support crews set up in this area truly enjoyed a hot meat after eating cold food all week.

#### Elks Serve Hot Meal for Flood Stricken New Bern Residents

Hurricane Florence hit the New Bern, North Carolina community with record setting floods and wind damage. Almost 1000 homes in the community of Fairfield Harbour lost power for over a week, leaving residents with spoiled food and surviving in severely damaged homes.

New Bern Elks Lodge, with the support of NC Elks Disaster Relief Funds, came to the rescue. On September 20<sup>th</sup> a team of Elks cooked and served a complete BBQ dinner with all the "fixin's" to hundreds of residents. Lodge Project Chair Jim Dunham said "*The Fairfield Harbour Community Center was packed and a line of cars a half a mile long were waiting before we even opened at 4:30PM*". Head Chef Mike Gerlach reported how the huge crowd was telling their flood stories and really enjoyed the break from the grind of salvaging their belongings. The logistics and publicity team of Elk Bob Manning and Fairfield Harbour POA Board member Gloria Hodgert had production and serving lines for *eat in's* and *take out's* that didn't stop until every bit of food and free groceries were gone in less than two hours. NC Elks also shipped pallets of water and building materials to New Bern and the other 32 lodges in the state.

### **Asheville & Hendersonville Lodges Honor WWII Veteran**



Wayne Carringer with Asheville Elks Lodge members Charlie Campbell, PDDGER and Skip Henderson, Exalted Ruler. June 14,2018, was a special night at the Charles George V.A. Medical Center in Asheville, North Carolina. One of their patients, Wayne Carringer, was about to turn ninety-eight (98) years old in a few days; and members and volunteers from both the Hendersonville (#1616) and Asheville (#608) Elks Lodges were on-hand to help him celebrate. A birthday cake was presented to him and all in attendance sang 'Happy Birthday'. Sadly, Wayne passed away a short time later on July 1<sup>st</sup>, surrounded by loved ones. He was a true American hero.

Wayne was one of our oldest surviving American soldiers who endured the Bataan Death March during World War II. He was a POW for nearly 3 and a half years. Starvation, beatings, torture, solitary confinement, humiliation, illness without medical treatment, and slave labor in a Japanese coal mine resulted in Wayne receiving the name 'Ghost Soldier'. The Federal Government had declared that Wayne was missing in action and presumed dead.

### **Kinston Elks Man Medication Collection Stations**

Earlier this year, the Kinston Elks along with Partnership for Children manned three different stations with law enforcement, collecting medication from community members. We are always amazed at how well the community participates in this event. Kinston Elks are partners with Partnership for Children and we're always happy to be active with this wonderful organization.


