### Charitable Trust & PER Assn. Grants Available

#### NC Charitable Trust Community Grants Application Info 2018

Administered by the NCSEA, these \$1000 grants available to the first 20 lodges that apply no earlier than July 1

#### Requirements

<u>New</u> – Grants must be used to start a project that the Lodge has never previously funded. If your Lodge received a NCCT grant in the past, it can be used to continue that project. Ideally, your Lodge will continue to use the NC Grant for the same successful project year after year.

<u>Elks-led</u> - Project requires hands-on Elk involvement. The Lodge oversees the grant funds and project details. The project can't benefit only the Lodge.

<u>Activity</u>- Project must be active and focus on a single community need. It cannot be a donation of supplies or funds, and cannot be split between projects. Elks involvement must be directly related to the use of funds.

**Charitable Focus:** NCCT Grants should always be used for charitable purposes. Keep the following IRS defined categories in mind when planning a grant project: relieve the poor, distressed or underprivileged; advance education, but not through scholarships; lessen the burdens of government; lessen neighborhood tensions; eliminate prejudice and discrimination; combat juvenile delinquency.

**Restrictions:** NCCT Grant guidelines state that Lodges may not use grants to support NC Major Projects, national Elks programs, fund scholarships, Hoop Shoot events, youth awards nights, posterand/oressaycontests, appreciations dinners, fundraisers organeral community events.

Grants may not be used for Lodge maintenance and/or repairs, or to only benefit the lodge or Lodge members and their families. Grant funds must serve a population in need, and cannot be donations of funds or supplies to individuals.

#### NC State Elks PER Association Local Community Grant Program

The NC State Elks PER Associations Local Community Grant Program. This will be 2 grants of \$2,000.00. They will be award to a Lodge for a local community project.

**Purpose:** To help local Lodge fund community involvement project that will get the Lodge members more involved in the community.

**Guidelines:** This must be a new project that involves the Lodge in the local community. The grant may not be used for National or State Major Projects. Grants may not be used for lodge maintenance and/or repair.

**Eligibility:** The local Lodge must have an active PER Association that is in good standing with the NCSEA PER Assn. Once a Lodge has been awarded a grant that Lodge will not be eligible to apply for another grant for two physical years.

**Application Dates:** The application must be submitted by mail to the PER Association Secretary on or before September 1, of that physical year. The grants will be awarded at the Fall Meeting of the NCSEA PER Association at the Fall NC State Elks Association Convention. The Lodges awarded the grants should use them before June 1, of the following physical year. The Lodge's application should be submitted and approved before the project occurs.





#### **High Point Elks Donate to Red Cross Home Fire Campaign**





The High Point Elks Lodge presented a \$2,000 Gratitude Grant to the High Point Chapter of the American Red Cross in support of the Home Fire Campaign in our community. The Home Fire Campaign was launched in October 2014 across the country with a goal to reduce the number of deaths and injuries by fire by 25% in five years. To achieve this, they make homes safer by installing smoke alarms, replacing batteries and doing fire safety education. Working with local fire departments, the Red Cross identifies high risk areas and canvass those neighborhoods to reach out to people who either do not have smoke alarms or have ones without working batteries. Members of our local fire department, Red Cross staff and our High Point Elks volunteers will work side by side during these smoke alarm canvassing events to install alarms and replace batteries. We also provide fire safety instruction and have leave behinds including refrigerator magnets on which we help people create their own individual escape plans.

#### **Calabash Elks Donate to Operation Cookie Drop**

The Calabash Elks Lodge recently made a \$500.00 donation to Girl Scout Troop 657 in Shallotte, NC to add to their coffers for "Operation Cookie Drop." The Donation bought 125 Boxes of Cookies which will eventually make their way to our Troops stationed overseas. "Operation Cookie Drop" is a program of the North Carolina's Southern Pines Girl Scouts Council. Monies are collected to purchase cookies, and then the Cookies are bundled up and transported to local Military Installations where they are prepared for shipment to our Military Personnel stationed overseas, for "A Little Piece of Home" for the troops. Over the past 12 years, more than 900,000 boxes of cookies have been sent to our troops, and their goal this year was to reach 1 Million boxes of cookies!
