PSP Ron Delzer and GER Hidley held a Parade of Lodges for ENF and \$3,000.00 was collected. Thank you to all who participated in that Parade. During the business luncheon Kevin Black and Toni Deal kept us entertained with a presentation on how the new Convention Survey Feedback system works and how to fill it out online. Look for many changes to be made to the Convention format in the coming years with more emphasis on training. The Convention Committee has been revised and expanded and is now headed up by Michael Bryant as Chairman and Shari Driscoll as Vice Chairman. Kevin Black is the Treasurer and Ashley Buckwell is the Secretary. There will be at least two representatives from each district on the Committee. Past State Presidents Lee Littiken and Steve Clarke will remain as active advisors to the Committee. At the Convention Lee and Steve were recognized for their many decades of service to the Committee and each received plaques commemorating that achievement!



And thanks to all who contributed to that important event!

Message from Grand Exalted Ruler Bruce Hidley



t's hard to believe the end of 2022 is here. There are so many ways to reflect upon the month of December. On Sunday, December 4, we Elks pledge Fidelity to our Members who have entered into the realm of eternity. Lodges across our great country will pay a just tribute of affection and honor to all the Members who no longer answer when their names are called. The Elks Memorial Service is a very solemn day when we hear the chimes of eleven rings in honor of our deceased Members. The Members who we honor on Memorial Sunday spent many hours of dedicated service to their Lodges. It is a fitting tribute to them to have their families with us at this memorial ceremony. Their names shall endure forever in our

tablets of love and memory. We thank the Jolly Corks who found the need for a formal memorial service as fellow Members passed. Through their insight, a formal designation took place in 1889 at the Grand Lodge Convention proclaiming the first Sunday in December would be designated as Memorial Sunday. "An Elk is never forgotten, never forsaken." May all our deceased Brothers and Sisters rest in peace and may they all be enjoying that great Elks Lodge above. Let us not forget Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day on December 7. It is a day to remember and honor all who died in the attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. I have personally toured Pearl Harbor in Hawaii. It is an absolutely solemn experience to visit the memorial above the USS Arizona and see the names of over 2,400 Americans who were killed that day. In addition to the lives lost, more than 1,100 troops were wounded during the attack. In a speech to congress, President Franklin D. Roosevelt stated that the bombing of Pearl Harbor was a date which will live in infamy. There were no truer words spoken. Please take the time at your Lodge to lower the Flag to half-staff on Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day to honor all the military personnel who were killed in this attack. May they all rest in peace. December is also a time when we celebrate the Christmas holiday with family and friends. Christmas is a very busy time of the year as we decorate our homes and Lodges, put up and decorate Christmas trees, and shop for our loved ones. Christmas is when we as Elks must practice one of the Cardinal Principles of our Order, Charity. NCSEA Charitable Trust Update

The following information was shared at the Fall Convention highlighting the great work of the Charitable Trust.

As a reminder the Trust is a separate Corporation with its own BOD and Bylaws. Your donations are invested in our Endowment Fund and only the earnings from our investments are used to support the NCSEA programs and projects. This allows long term continuity of our funding resources.

This year, the CT funded \$6,000 in additional Scholarship money for the State Association and provided 15 Lodges with \$1,500 Community Grants for a total of \$22,500.

As of the Convention, there were still (5) \$1,500 grants available! Applications are on ncelks.org. It's an easy way to support a local nonprofit in your community.

The Patriot Foundation selected our Goldsboro Lodge to administer this program.

They provided 5 scholarships (\$23,000) this year and since 2020 has given out 15 scholarships totaling \$60,500.

Elk Crossing Signs Installed in Western NC



A winding stretch of road in western portions of North Carolina is safer for both elk and human alike thanks to behind-the-scenes work by the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation and its volunteers.

“U.S. Highway 19 crossing Soco Mountain from the Jackson-Haywood County Line and the town of Maggie Valley was the most critical roadway regarding deaths of elk due to an encounter with an automobile,” said Joyce Cooper, long-time co-chair of the RMEF Great Smoky Mountains Chapter. “This winding two-lane road down the steep mountain gives elk and the drivers a minimum amount of time to evade each other.”
