



Attendees are in for an evening of entertainment and charitable giving as the Morehead City Beaufort Lodge announces its upcoming charity fundraiser.


The free event will take place from 5-10 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 12 and will feature live music from Motherload and Velvet Allstars.

Both Agner and Martin are veterans. Martin is a retired 1st Sergeant and served for 32 years with the NC Army National Guard. Agner joined the Army after graduating high school. He spent 23 years in the military, most of it with the North Carolina National Guard

"I love our flag with all my heart," said Agner, "and everything it stands for." Agner has been member of the Elks for 65 years.

He reflected on what the flag means to him during his address. Like the BPOE, Agner holds the flag to its highest honor and respect. The core principles of charity, justice, brotherly love, and fidelity symbolize the significance of the flag to the Order.

"It was emotional and very uplifting," said Martin. "The flag has special meaning to our veterans who are grateful and proud. For the people who had never attended a Flag Day ceremony, they loved it. There were not many dry eyes during the service especially when Harry was speaking."




SALISBURY LODGE AWARDS SCHOLARSHIPS
