I hope everyone had the opportunity to see the Elks fabulous patriotic Rose Bowl Parade float, a great honor for the BPOE USA! The Elks paid tribute to our Veterans keeping our promise As Long As There Are Veterans The Elks Will Never Forget Them and We Never Have.

We have new opportunities and challenges. First and foremost our first priority is the continued growth of our membership, and we all as Elks are on the Lodge Membership team, there is plenty of time to propose a new member, encourage a delinquent member to pay their dues and invite someone to be reinstated. YTD REPORT FROM THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

The January membership report shows that our current total is 10,712. That is over 500 more than we ended up with last year. That sounds good until you figure in the 673 delinquent members on our rolls. There are 148 candidates in waiting, so we need to get all of those in before March 31 if we are going to stand a chance to have a third straight year of growth. If we can get all of those candidates in, plus bring back some of the delinquents and find a way to get some more new members, then we will have a shot at reaching our goal. This will only happen if we focus on our objective to increase membership. I would like to point out that the East District is the only District currently with a membership increase. The East Central, West Central and West are showing a membership loss. There is still time to correct that, but not too much time!

I would like to congratulate the top Lodges in each District for their outstanding work year to date. Oak Island is showing a membership gain of 56 new Elks, Raleigh is at a plus 34, Hickory is at plus 17 and Reidsville is at plus 16. Of our 32 Lodges, only 16 are showing growth this year. At the beginning of December, Veterans Chairman, Mike Flock learned that the Charlotte, NC Veterans Administration team (led by Jaderian Ackerman with HUD-VASH Housing of Veterans Affairs) was working on housing 40 homeless veterans in a newly constructed apartment complex, Eastway Crossings, in Charlotte. Few details were initially available, but the members unanimously voted for attempting to put a Welcome Home Kit into each Veterans apartment.

On December 14th, members were informed that these Veterans will begin moving in on Monday the 18th or Tuesday the 19th. The Veterans Activities Committee sprang into action. In a matter of 5 days, the members of Lake Norman Elks Lodge purchased 40 of every item that is provided in a Welcome Home Kit. Budget of 12K! of which Grand Lodge will reimburse us with proper documentation / receipts to be submitted. Multiple shopping trips to multiple stores, along with online purchasing, were required. ER Shelly Sperling; PERs Kathy Hulla, Jim Mulvihill, Bob Burke; Chaplin Anne Burke, and PDDGERs Mike Flock, John Hulla completed the shopping on Monday afternoon.

On Tuesday December 19th it was all hands on for delivery, assembly, and distribution of 40 Welcome Home kits. A 20-foot box truck was rented to pick up items from the members who made purchases. The truck was unloaded at the apartment complex and all items transported to the 2^{nd} floor of the building. The assembly line for putting the kits together was an impressive sight to behold. With precision and efficiency, the kits were assembled and ready to be delivered in a few hours. Members (including the above along with Rick Thayer and Jack Kirkland and new member to be Hannah Modaffari), family & friends of the Elks, VA personnel, and other sincere volunteers made quick work of the task. With enthusiasm, the kits were delivered across the 4 floors of the complex to eagerly awaiting Veterans. The final kit was delivered at 5 pm.
