

In August the District Deputies will hold their first DD Clinic, please plan to attend your District Deputy Clinic. See out website for the date for your district.





HICKORY ELKS CELEBRATE FLAG DAY AND

HONOR PATRIOTS

A crowd gathered on the front lawn at the Hickory Elks Lodge Friday evening, June 14th to celebrate and honor the flag of our country in what is officially known as Flag Day by President Woodrow Wilson's Presidential Proclamation on June 14, 1916.

This year's red, white, and blue adorned celebration was replete with patriotic music, a historical review of the origin of Flag Day, and a demonstration of the proper way to retire a worn flag once it has proudly served the United States. In recent years the Hickory Elks have honored a patriot from the area who has continuously demonstrated selfless service to our nation and to the community. Several patriots have been honored posthumously. Their names along with the names of 15 other patriots are now enshrined with engraved plates mounted on the base of the Elks Lodge flagpole known as "The Patriot's Pole". This year's Hickory Elks Patriot of the Year is, SP4 US Army Charles E. Crawford III. Highlighting his service to our nation, Mr Crawford served in the Vietnam War. Volunteering for a second back-to-back tour in the war zone with the 25th Infantry Division's Combat Engineers, he was severely wounded by the detonation of an improvised explosive device (IED) planted on a roadway by the enemy. After more than two years of medical treatment and almost losing a leg, Mr Crawford was medically retired from the military service. To this day, he continues to serve his country and community through volunteerism, especially in service to and remembrance of his fellow military veterans and wounded warriors.

This year's celebration also honored Chief Petty Officer (Retired) Matthew Cline, US Navy, who received the Hickory Elks Exceptional Military Service Person of the Year (Navy) award for his 20 years of service to our nation. Today, Chief Petty Officer (CPO) Cline serves as a Naval Science Instructor for the Newton-Conover High School Navy JROTC program. It was noted by one of Cline's students, Cadet Lieutenant Commander Chris Martin, that CPO Cline deserves this recognition because, "You see, no one ever asks him to be the one to step up and lead this generation of cadets to success, he willingly does this on his own accord".
